## What is a Neighbourhood Plan?

## **Five Key Points**

- the Plan what residents want their neighbourhood to be like in 5-10-15 years' time.
- The range of **issues** that the Plan deals with can include housing, education, transport and movement, employment, heritage, leisure and recreation.
- Through the **Neighbourhood Forum**, residents develop **planning policies** for improving their neighbourhood proposing specific types of development on particular sites and the provision of new community facilities.
- The policies and proposals have to be approved via a referendum of all local residents.

## Will it make a difference? Yes.

The Hove Station Neighbourhood Plan will be part of the city's statutory development plan. It will sit alongside the city-wide Local Plan and will have to be taken into account by the Council when it is making decisions on planning applications.

This means that the Plan will have real weight. **Residents will have more influence** over what changes do and do not happen in their neighbourhood.
